

The Feast of St. Michael & All Angels

On the Feast of Michael and all Angels, popularly called Michaelmas, we give thanks for the many ways in which God's loving care watches over us, both directly and indirectly, and we are reminded that the richness and variety of God's creation far exceeds our knowledge of it.

Michael (the name means "Who is like God?") is said to be the captain of the heavenly armies. He is mentioned in the Scriptures in Daniel 10:13,31; 12:1 (where he is said to be the prince of the people of Israel); in Jude 9 (where he is said to have disputed with the devil about the body of Moses); and in Revelation 12:7 (where he is said to have led the heavenly armies against those of the great dragon). He is generally pictured in full armor, carrying a lance, and with his foot on the neck of a dragon.



Angels? Well, since they appear to excel us in both knowledge and power, they remind us that, even among created things, we humans are not the top of the heap. Since it is the common belief that demons are angels who have chosen to disobey God and to be His enemies rather than His willing servants, they remind us that the higher we are the lower we can fall.

The greater our natural gifts and talents, the greater the damage if we turn them to bad ends. The more we have been given, the more will be expected of us. And, in the picture of God sending His angels to help and defend us, we are reminded that apparently God, instead of doing good things directly, often prefers to do them through His willing servants, enabling those who have accepted His love to show their love for one another.

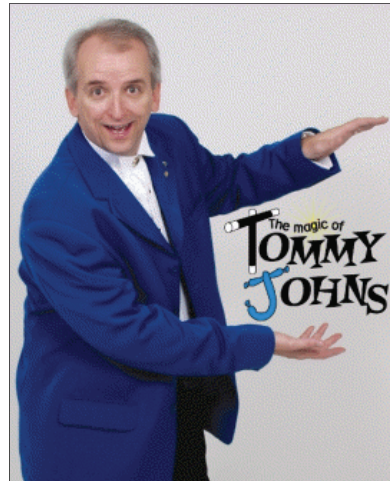

The third Wednesday of each month will bring to St. Michael & All Angels another fun filled program and delicious lunch for the Seniors in our community.

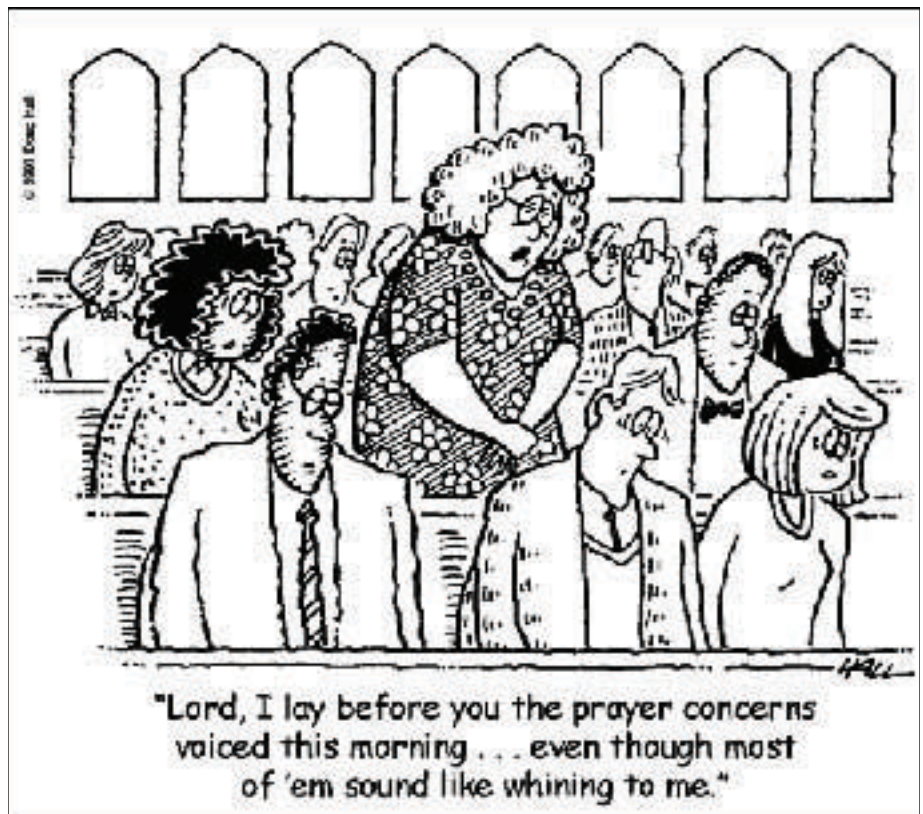

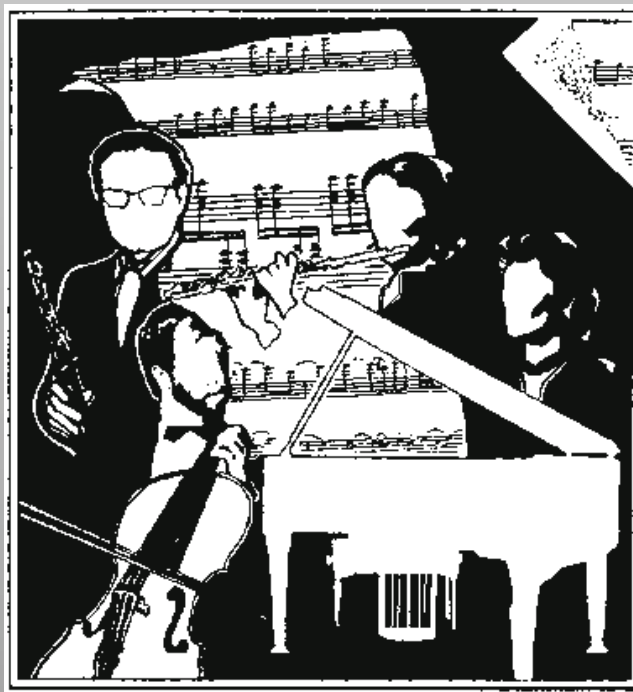
Thrift Shop 1962-2010

Fundraising began in 1953 with the first building and mortgage at St. Michael & All Angels. Bazaars and frequent dinners to collect money were they prepared and served by the Vestry and other men of the Church. The ECW entered the world of trade with a ramshackle thrift store on Main Street. In 1962 the current building housing the Thrift Shop was purchased and the women of the church took turns as janitors, stock girls and clerks. The profits went to the building fund. The Thrift Shop has served its purpose and will close October 30, 2010.

How to submit legislation for the 2010 Annual Council

Resolutions and amendments to the Constitution and Canons may be presented by convocations or diocesan departments and commissions or any lay delegate or clergy member.

Resolutions, **except for canon or constitution changes**, may be submitted any time before Council recesses on the first legislative day. Thereafter, a resolution must receive a two-thirds affirmative vote of approval of its introduction to Council. To be published on the diocesan website before Council or to be included in the next mailing, a Resolution on any matter must be e-mailed (MS Word attachment preferred) to council@episcopalatlanta.org by **Oct. 7, 2010**.

Amendments to the diocesan constitution or canons must be submitted to the Council Standing Committee on Constitution and Canons no later than **Oct. 12, 2010**. Send them to the Council Secretary, The Rev. Herschel R. Atkinson, 509 Rhodes Drive, Elberton, GA, 30635-2006 or by e-mail MS Word attachment to olsmaj@comcast.net. Send a copy to council@episcopalatlanta.org.

A resolution, except for constitution or canon changes, that has not been received by Oct. 7, 2010, will not be published on the diocesan website or in a mailing to delegates and members. It must be introduced before recess of the first legislative day of Council. Prepare 600 copies of the resolution and deliver them on the first day of Council to Mrs. Janet Patterson, chair of the Annual Council Committee, for distribution.

Formats

Please be guided by the formats below. Please do not use "whereas" clauses. Instead, include an "explanation" that focuses attention of the Council on the substance of the resolution.

A Model Resolution

Resolved, that resolutions submitted to any Council shall not include a preamble ("whereas" clauses); and be it further

Resolved, that any resolution or proposed Constitution or Canon change shall be followed by an explanation of the matter to be acted on by the Council.

EXPLANATION

Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised recommends that reasons for a motion not be in the motion or in a preamble, but be included in an attached explanation. This makes it clear that only the substance of the resolution is being acted on. A statement of the effect of the resolution can be included.

A Model Canonical Change of Some Complexity

Resolved, that Section 1 of Canon 23 Of Church Debt be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. No long term indebtedness shall be incurred by an Aided Parish or congregation without the prior approval of (a) both the Bishop and the Board of Officers, or (b) the Bishop and Department of Finance Committee.

EXPLANATION

Words to be deleted are lined through. Words to be added are underlined (or in italics if desired). The explanation should show the intent of and the effect of the proposed amendment. This format is followed also for proposed amendments to the Constitution or the Council Rules of Order.





Emmaus House Founded in 1967

The heart of Emmaus House is a sprawling, two-story home, circa 1890; its doors are painted bright red "for the holy spirit" explained Austin Ford in an article that appeared in Emory Magazine Autumn 1995.

Ford had a commitment to civil rights that began the summer of 1952. His civil rights activism and his anti-Vietnam War stance sometimes elicited the ire of politicians, Episcopal Church leaders and parishioners.

This was the beginning of Emmaus House. In fact, Emmaus House represents a longstanding bridge between Atlanta's middle-class, predominantly white Northside and its poor, mostly black Southside. During Sunday services at the chapel the congregation of black and white parishioners comfortably blend high Episcopal church liturgy and traditional African-American songs.

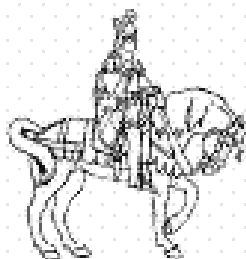

Blessing of Animals

As autumn arrives, people in various places may notice something odd.

A procession of animals, everything from dogs and cats to hamsters and even horses, is led to churches for a special ceremony called the Blessing of Pets.

This custom is conducted in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures.

Francis, whose feast day is October 4th, loved the larks flying about his hilltop town. He and his early brothers, staying in a small hovel, allowed themselves to be displaced by a donkey.

Francis wrote a Canticle of the Creatures, an ode to God's living things. "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures." And there was testimony in the cause for St. Clare of Assisi's canonization that referred to her little cat!

That there are today over 62 million cats in the U.S. attests to the continuing affection we have for our furry, feathered or finned friends. We've even had a cat called Socks in the White House. Other popular presidential pets range from Abraham Lincoln's Fido to Lyndon Johnson's beagles, named Him and Her.

For single householders, a pet can be a true companion. Many people arrive home from work to find a furry friend overjoyed at their return. Many a senior has a lap filled with a purring fellow creature.

The bond between person and pet is like no other relationship, because the communication between fellow creatures is at its most basic. Eye-to-eye, a man and his dog, or a woman and her cat, are two creatures of love.

No wonder people enjoy the opportunity to take their animal companions to church for a special blessing. Church is the place where the bond of creation is celebrated.

At Franciscan churches, a friar with brown robe and white cord often welcomes each animal with a special prayer. The Blessing of Pets usually goes like this:

"Blessed are you, Lord God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air and animals on the land. You inspired St. Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless this pet. By the power of your love, enable it to live according to your plan. May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation. Blessed are you, Lord our God, in all your creatures! Amen."
